Collegiately, Northwest Florida State once again shined on the hardwood and high school alumni spread their wings across the country in every venue, from cross country to football, basketball, the links and beyond.

Professionally, we saw Wil Spencer and Alexa Guarachi shine on the tennis courts, Tampa Bay defensive tackle Akeem Spence wreak havoc on quarterbacks and running backs, and Jimmy Nelson toss 1-2-3 innings for the Milwaukee Brewers.

It was truly a memorable year. So without further ado, I present our Top 10 Sports Stories of the Year.

1. NICEVILLE AND CHOCTAW FOOTBALL

Niceville and Choctaw football teams make Okaloosa County history by advancing to Final Four - Their narratives couldn't have been more disparate.

In one corner you had perennial power 7A Niceville, celebrating its 14th straight playoff trip with its second consecutive Final Four.

In the other was 6A Choctaw, building off its first district title since 2002 with its first Final Four in 24 years.

Together they made Okaloosa County history, becoming the first football teams to simultaneously represent the county - a 1,082square-mile stretch extending from the Gulf of Mexico to the Alabama state line — in the state semifinals.

The two played each other during the season, with the Eagles turbo-clocking the Indians at Joe Etheredge Stadium. Yet the programs found solidarity in their historical accomplishment.

Neither won - Niceville was routed on the road by Osceola and Choctaw lost a heartbreaker at home to nationally ranked Armwood - but that didn't lessen the significance of their deep postseason runs.

3. NICEVILLE **TENNIS**

Niceville girls win first state tennis title — It was inarguably the most dominant display the tennis state tournament had ever seen.

After a region final sweep of rival Leon – a powerhouse that celebrated state titles in 2010 and 2011 - the Niceville girls tennis team headed into the 3A state tournament humble and

What transpired was perfection. Niceville wasn't seeded like a favorite. But its swagger said otherwise.

Sam Sepe won her quarterfinal. As did Maddie Hsiang. Alexis Hruby, Antonia Poate and Antonia Vonhilsheimer followed suit in their respective draws.

Then for an encore in the semifinals, they did it again in

convincing fashion, earning 10 points. To cap the 12-point day, Sepe and Poate and the Hsiang sisters won their doubles matches.

The next day, the Eagles rode the perfect start to a 13-12 win over Creekside to capture the program's first state title.



2. PATRICK HARRINGTON DIES

NWF State women's basketball coach Patrick Harrington dies after car wreck - In early October, Northwest Florida State College and the Emerald Coast were rocked by the passing of Raider women's basketball coach Patrick Harrington.

Just 51 when he succumbed to injuries suffered from a head-on car collision, Harrington was a brilliant basketball mind, loving husband and caring father to

From his locker-room speeches to his postgame interviews to every moment he wielded the Raider clipboard, he exuded class and humility. Brought in to put NWF State back on the map, he did just that and more. In just four years, he built the Raiders into a perennial

He did so by preaching fundamentals, lauding effort and championing the values of a lockdown defense. Reinforcing those basic principles were an unmatched sense of humor and passion for the game.

He won an average of 25 games a year during his tenure. He also broke two 18-year droughts in the 2012-13 campaign with a Co-Panhandle Conference championship and an NJCAA tournament appearance, the first of back-to-back Elite Eight appearances.
